Brandon first worked at Waitrose as a delivery driver after completing his A Levels to make money and to delay being on a fluctuating job market after completing his course. It was a

rigorous application process which he started in

September 2020.

Brandon started in January 2021 and after passing 14 exams over 6 months land based he is now working towards his 200 flight hours he will need before taking his Commercial Pilots License. It was eye opening to find the course costs £100,000 and even then he will need to take a conversion test with an airline that can cost another £30,000 to fly with them.
