## Pathway E

$>$ This is the pathway the majority of students are placed on.
>It represents a broad academic curriculum combination with the core and applied literacy, numeracy and language skills and knowledge which the school knows to be of educational importance;
> It facilitates entry to competitive university and college courses and careers.
> It means that students are entered for the Ebacc, a government-approved suite of qualifications which it is expected that the majority of students are entered for.

Ebacc consists of: GCSE English Language, GCSE Mathematics
GCSE Combined Science or Triple Science
GCSE Modern Foreign Language
GCSE History or Geography

## Pathway E-further notes

> You should assume, unless you are specifically told otherwise, that you are on Pathway E. This is because you are automatically on this pathway, as are most students.
> Pathway E students are not informed by letter that they are on Pathway E for the reasons stated above. You cannot choose your pathway.
> The school recommends that one of your open choices be a practical or performative subject (i.e. PE, Drama, Music, Art, Technology) in order to provide balance in your timetable, and also because these subjects partially comprise non-examined assessment (NEA-coursework) which can be completed during the school year before the intense examination period.
$>$ You are welcome to take more than one MFL, or History AND Geography.

## Pathway C:

> Where a student is identified as needing particular additional support in order to ensure the best possible chance of a standard or strong pass in either/both English Language and Maths, they will follow this pathway which replaces one option with a programme of Core Skills, including a combination of extra foundation English and/or Maths.
> Options information (letters, login codes for Options Online etc) are always sent to YOU, not to your parents. As Year 9 students growing into young adults and GCSE students, YOU are now expected to manage your future aspirations and choices.

## GCSE Science: What is Combined and Triple Science?

- Everyone has to do Science at GCSE.
- This includes Biology, Chemistry and Physics
- You will be invited to take either Combined Science or Triple Science.
- Combined Science is $\mathbf{x 2}$ GCSE qualifications, Triple Science is $\mathbf{x 3}$. Both are 6
 lessons a week, so studying Triple requires more independent learning.
- We will predominantly look at your end of KS3 assessment and then select which students are invited to choose whether to study Triple Science or not.
- You do not have to pick triple it if you receive this letter.
- This will not affect wanting to study a science at sixth form or college.
- (depending on your GCSE grade!)


This does not change your other GCSE option choices or pathway in any way.

## Additional information

- You will also continue to have Core PE lessons

Activities focussing on getting you active and keeping you healthy both in mind and body. This includes students who have chosen GCSE PE.

- You will also continue to have LLL lessons

Activities focussing on learning and developing important skills and knowledge about life, health, relationships, careers and the wider world.
